COMMUNICATION IS NOT JUST READING, WRITING, and SPEAKING, BUT IS A MICROCOSM OF LIFE: Using all of humanity (the 'Arts') to enhance communication between yourself and others to reach common goals and develop tolerance for ambiguity.

OUR CLASS SPEAKS TO THE REAL WORLD: We do what "real" people do.

PROVIDE A SAFE, CARING, NURTURING ENVIRONMENT FOR YOU TO TAKE RISKS, TO EVALUATE YOUR BEING, TO FIND YOURSELF: You are a contributor just as I am, you have a stake in what happens here. We are a community of inspired life-long learners.
